EUROJAM!

Alison Parker explains what she did last summer.

Mark has already written about his experience on the Eurojam, build, so I thought I should eventually get round at adding my own experiences about working there as a climbing instructor.

I was instructing as part of the European Scout Jamboree Eurojam" which was held in Chelsmford (on the V festival site) in August 2005. Our team of thirty were actually based at Gilwell Park, Scouting HQ, about 20 miles away. This meant that every day, one thousand 11-18 year olds were bussed onto the site and rotated round various activities, one of which was the "mountain zone". There were five activities on the zone – climbing, abseiling,

bouldering (traversing), caving (in an artificial cave system made of straw bales) and rolling wall. As instructors we took turns to instruct all these activities, as well as harnessing and helmeting (definitely the worst job).

With about 200 kids coming through every hour it often

felt more like "batch processing" than climbing, but as with all instructing, there were some great moments – seeing the terrified child get to the top or abseil over the edge, sharing





stories with people from all over the world, bantering with the other instructors to make the kids laugh.



With all the kids being bussed in every morning, it meant that they were all bussed

> out again at 5.30pm, leaving us free to spend the evenings as we liked. Highlights included the high ropes course, which mostly involved climbing to the top of a wobbly pole and jumping off, and playing around of the abseil tower- crucifix abseils are a lot harder than the marines make them look! None of the car-free, alcohol-

free zones of the main site, although we were allowed to go there occasionally including for "Celebrate Europe Day" and the closing ceremony. It was amazing to look round the eight thousand strong crowd and think, "every single one of these kids has come and climbed in our zone!".

Overall it was a much better experience than I had hoped – I made loads of good friends who I'm still in touch with (including two from DUSAGG) and experienced the "international camp thing" for a fraction of the price of the IST (we were technically "Locally Recruited Volunteers") and without having to clean a single toilet. And more importantly we got superior food.
